Welcome to my Cultural Anthropology class. I am an Adjunct Professor of Anthropology at College of the Canyons as well as other community colleges for the Los Angeles Community College District. My approach to teaching my students is like a coach: I am here to cheer you on and offer advice and assistance to help you succeed. But it's up to you to do the work. My research interests are diverse. I recently taught two sections of the Anthropology of Religion, Magic and Witchcraft in Los Angeles and now my head into things spiritual. However, in the past my research interests have included Disaster Anthropology (my latest involvement was with the Thomas Fire in 2017), volunteering as a field archaeologist with prehistoric and Mission Era Chumash material culture in Ventura County, education in rural Bihar, India (my last visit was in 2015), the subculture of organic farmers and CSA volunteers, and the subcultures and foodways of triathletes and marathon runners. After working for the Jane Goodall Institute, I wish I could do more to support the people I met in Tanzania, their rich heritage and African wildlife. My favorite monkeys are, by far, howler monkeys (Alouatta palliata). I did census of them in Gigante, Nicaragua in 2013. Before becoming a full-time college professor, I volunteered as a disaster relief worker for community service organizations in the US and abroad and the American Red Cross. My day job during those years, was working as a web developer and being a busy parent of two athletic and creative (yes, you can be both) school age children. In the 1990s I was a nationally-ranked triathlete and qualified for the World Ironman Triathlon Championships in Kona, Hawaii in 1994. But that was probably before you were born and now I run very, very slowly! (I mostly just jog, swim, and hike when I'm not working.) I'm happily married and have two busy adult children: A son who recently graduated from UC Davis and a daughter who goes to UC Berkeley. After seeing what our kids had to do to get into those universities, I have a lot of empathy for my students! I have earned a Skilled Teacher Certificate, EOPS Recognition Awards, and have been on the Civic Engagement Steering Committee at College of the Canyons. For volunteer disaster relief I was honored to received a Red Cross Hero Award. But what makes me really proud happens when I'm teaching. It is seeing my current students succeed! Course DescriptionWelcome! Cultural Anthropology is the scientific study of the role of culture in shaping human behavior. In other words, cultural anthropologists seek to explain why people do what they do according to their society's (or group's) culture. Culture consists of the learned values, beliefs, and rules of conduct shared to some extent by the members of a society. In this class especially, it is important to be curious about cultural beliefs and practices that are different from your own. Instead of judging cultural practices, values, or beliefs that are foreign to you as "weird" or "different", instead ask "why do they do it this way?" Or "what can I learn from these people?" This approach of nonjudgemental curiosity about human cultural differences is called cultural relativism, and it is what we strive for in our class. In our increasingly globalized world, it is ever more important to understand people from cultures different from our own. Cultural anthropology also reminds us that, despite our differences, we are all share a common human nature and many of the same life experiences and dreams for a better future.
