These are sometimes violent words, for example: Battle of thugs. A mate is a violent person and a battle is a fight (it is a noun and a verb). This headline could also read: Some thugs have been fighting, however this does not have the same impact as the previous brief holder. Omitted the headlines often do not include verbs and articles, for example, more resignations of MP on the rank of expenses. If we put this in English spoken then the phrase would say: more Parliamentarians have resigned by the fight on expenses. expenses. It means that Members of Parliament have left their jobs because of disagreements over what they should be able to claim on expenditure. Another example would be a new flood alert. This means that there have been warnings that there might be more flooding. A key part of the language of the newspaper is wordplay. Words with two different meanings in English can be used in a fun and entertaining way. This is called a pun. For example, short personal? That's good for Mr. Sarkozy. This headline is reproduced with the short word. Short staff means there are not enough staff to do the job. However, this article refers to the fact that, during a visit to a factory, all the staff, was presented that it was short because it is only 1.7m. Another example would be that the police were drunk on the street. This headline plays with the word drunk. One meaning is that the police found themselves drunk on the street. The second meaning is that the police found a drunk man on the street. Soun Strings: It is also common to have a row of nouns in a headline. For example, the headache of the Prime Minister's traffic. This means the Prime Minister has had some kind of problem with the traffic. Another example would be an increase in teenage pregnancy. This means that there has been an increase in teenage pregnancy. Alliteration of alliteration is when a sound is repeated. It is often used in poetry, as well as newspapers. Newspapers use it to attract the eye and make it more memorable. For example, the media makes Madonna angry. The 'M' is repeated 4 times. The headlines of ambiguity are often ambiguous, which makes the reader see the article. If we take the previous title, the word 'MAD' is ambiguous because it could mean crazy or it could mean very angry. Also, the word It is ambiguous in the word play for example. Verbo changes are often changed into the headlines. Simple time is used in place of continuous or perfect time and infinitive is used for the future. For example, Brown is renounced. This is used use brown has resigned. Another example would be pm to visit USA. This is used instead of the prime minister will visit the United States. Relative references and clauses to prevent repeat newspapers from using a lot of references. This is using a pronoun or another noun instead of a name. Next time you read an article, find the main topic and see how many different ways the writer refers to this. In the extract of the article below, Madonna also refers to the CAUSE of the Singer ## / EMSHE. Relative clauses are used to provide more information on the noun and also save space on the page. In the extract there are two relative clauses, the first tells us that Madonna is in America and the second that she is 50. Madonna, who is currently in America, saw red when a photographer closed too much. The singer, now 50, shouted abuse before she was taken. I hope that this brief view of the newspaper's language encourages him to read more articles from the English newspapers. With most of them available online, it is easy for you to find one you enjoy.
