Summing up, God Hesed is his redeeming love. Despite the sinful rebellion of the people of God, they are saved from judgment and reconciled through the work of salvation of God. It is important to note that this is God's constant love for his people, who enters the realm of the doctrine of election. Throughout the Old Testament we see God Hesed expressed toward Israel. In the New Testament, the Gentiles are "hidden blocks" as full members of the "people of God", while some branches are cut because "not all Israel is true" (Romans 9:6-7, 11:11-24). Because Hesed is important Hesed's love is one of God's attributes. What does this matter? Hesed is the engine of his work of salvation. Moreover, God allowed the nation of Jerusalem to face the consequences, without offering immediate deliverance. âHe has made my chains heavy; even if I call and weep for help, He extinguishes my prayerâ. (Lamentations 3:7-8) Jeremiah has become so overwhelmed with pain that she feels as if her prayers were not received by God. Not only that, Jeremiah speaks and mentions God as more adversary than a friend. âHe is a bear waiting for me, a lion in hiding; he has set aside my steps and torn me to pieces; he has destroyed me. He has made me desolate; he has bent his bow, and made me a target for his arrow". (Lamentations 3:10-12) For his part, God is out of punishing them for their transgressions. Instead of having a God God He will answer his prayers, Jeremiah feels hunted and targeted. This description sounds contradictory to other descriptions of the Bible where God's love is mentioned in collaboration with forgiveness and mercy. The contradiction is intentional because it conveys the profound state Jeremiah experienced together with others in Jerusalem. Only later in the passage he returns to God's most loving description and includes where he wrote verse 22. â € "The constant love The Lord never ceases; His mercies never come to the end. »(Lamentations 3:22) However painful the consequences of sin, Jeremiah does not neglect to show his hope in God. He remains spiritually faithful even when emotionally he was upset with pain. More importantly, Jeremiah does not neglect to show mercy to his people, no matter their sins, and he will never leave full devastation to come them. At the end of the passage, Jeremiah became so confident in God who writes how the Lord will have revenge against the enemies of Jerusalem. This chapter presented God as an enemy and friend. Sin may have separated the people of God from him for a certain period, but not forever. Now, Christians today can use this same information to not only understand God's mercy when we sin but better understand his relationship with us. Why is it encouraging for believers? The structure of the laments 3 recalls the passages like Psalm 13, where The author speaks in a very lugur tone to begin, before offering a reversal in the narrative. They move from mourning to joy, knowing that they can put trust in God. Moreover, lamentation 3 gives us proof of God that does not keep sin against us. He allowed his people to feel the consequences of their actions, but over time to return them to power and reputation. Before Jeremiah experienced this he had already had hope. When we sin as believers today, we know with certainty that Jesus Christ died for our sins (Hebrews 9:15). This is proof that God does not keep sin against us. He will not act like a lion waiting for prey as Jeremiah described it. Instead, he is a father who waits patiently for us to change from our sinful ways.
